Your son will study the **AQA English Language (8700) and AQA English Literature (8702) Specifications**.

Throughout Year 10, your son will answer each of the sections of the Language and Literature papers. This will generally take place at the end of unit which typically coincides with the end of each half term. There will be a MOCK exam for both papers at the end of Year 10. Both subjects are 100% exams and it must be stressed that it requires constant revision throughout the two years.

Skills in Language – Reading

AO1 • Identify and interpret explicit and implicit information and ideas. • Select and synthesise evidence from different texts. **AO2** • Explain, comment on and analyse how writers use language and structure to achieve effects and influence readers, using relevant subject terminology to support their views. **AO3** • Compare writers' ideas and perspectives, as well as how these are conveyed, across two or more texts. **AO4** • Evaluate texts critically and support this with appropriate textual references.

How can I support my son with English?

- The most important thing you can do to support your son in English is to encourage his independent reading at home. Reading a wide range of texts – novels, non-fiction, newspapers and magazines – will infinitely help your son access the texts he studies at school and the exams he will take. Reading little and often is paramount to ensure your son has the ability to sustain his concentration over a period of time, build up his vocabulary and observe good writing practices.
- When your son has homework, look over it. Encourage him to write more and to complete it before the due date. Leaving a day before the work is due can help in the revision process.
- There are a number of revision guides available in newsagents and online. These revision guides should be used throughout the course, and not before the exams.
- Working hard in class, stretching himself and trying his best every lesson will ensure exam success. This is a two year course and it cannot be understood / remembered at the end of Year 11. It must be worked at over time.
